



# Importing Personal Property Into

# BOLIVIA

## IMPORTING HOUSEHOLD GOODS/ PERSONAL EFFECTS AND PETS

### DUTY-FREE ENTRY IS PERMITTED IF THE FOLLOWING REQUIREMENTS ARE MET:

- The shipper is a foreign diplomat. Duty-free entry is not granted to Bolivian diplomats returning to Bolivia.

### SHIPMENTS OTHER THAN DIPLOMATIC

- The packing list should not include any values of the items listed.
- Customs will assess 32% over the estimate value for personal effects and linens.

### Notes:

- For shipments containing new furniture/household goods and/or alcohol, if the value exceeds USD \$1,000.00, an authorized verifying company must intervene.
- The shipper must be present for customs clearance.
- Customs reserves the right to inspect all shipments before clearing them. Customs inspections will occur only in the presence of the shipper or his/her authorized agent.
- Duties will be assessed at 42% over CIF value for electrical appliances and 32% for personal computers.

### REQUIRED DOCUMENTS

- ✓ Valid passport
- ✓ Original Inventory list in Spanish and 5 copies.
- ✓ The original Insurance policy and 2 copies of it.
- ✓ Original bill of lading or airway bill

### PROHIBITED ITEMS

- Firearms and ammunition
- Explosives
- Drugs and narcotics
- Pornographic material

### RESTRICTED ITEMS

- New furniture and household goods will be subject to duties of 42% over CIF value and require invoices.
- Alcohol and tobacco products are subject to duties of approximately 42% over the CIF value.
- Food requires a Certificate of Sanitation.
- Medicine.
- Plants require a Phytosanitary Certificate.
- Carpets.
- Precious metal objects (e.g. jewelry and coins).
- Works of art and antiques will be assessed 32% duties over CIF Value. Required documents include: commercial invoices, list of titles of the pieces of art, export permit from country of origin, bill of lading or airway bill and an insurance policy.

### IMPORTATION OF DOGS AND CATS

- Non-diplomatic shipments are subject to payment of 32% duties over CIF Value.
- Duty-free for Diplomats.

### REQUIRED DOCUMENTS

- ✓ Health Certificate issued at origin by a certified veterinarian.
- ✓ Inoculation Certificate

### IMPORTATION OF MOTOR VEHICLES

- A value inspection must occur for shipments other than diplomatic. A Bolivian contractor company must carry out this inspection at origin.
- If the freight on board value of the vehicle exceeds USD \$12,000, the shipper must pre-authorize importation through the SGS or the Inspectorate.
- When a commercial invoice for a used car is unavailable, the authorized Verifying Companies in Bolivia must intervene. Complete details of the general and technical characteristics of the vehicle should be sent to Bolivia.

## IMPORTING MOTOR VEHICLES, CONTINUED

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### IMPORTATION OF VEHICLES, CONT'D

- Non-diplomatic shipments are subject to payment of 42% over CIF Value.
- Duty-free for diplomats.

### REQUIRED DOCUMENTS

- ✓ Commercial Invoice
- ✓ Technical report including a technical pollution inspection and good performance.
- ✓ Insurance Policy: original and 2 copies.
- ✓ Certificate of Origin.
- ✓ Verifying Certificate for shipments other than diplomatic.
- ✓ Description of automobile, including the make, model, year, etc.
- ✓ Title.
- ✓ Registration.
